### From the Desk of Pastor Meyer

**On the 12<sup>th</sup> Day of Christmas, My True Love Gave to Me...The Feast of Epiphany!!!**

"On the twelfth day of Christmas, my true love gave to me..." You've heard the song and you may be one of the few who can get through all twelve stanzas in the right order without cheat notes. There are gold rings, leaping lords and dancing ladies and something about ducks and swans and milking cows, too. I can't keep it all straight. It's for the birds, I think. Come to think about it, it seems the whole song is for the birds – ducks, swans, calling birds, and a partridge stuck in a pear tree that won't go away, no matter how many times we sing about him.

There's an old myth that floats around every year that this silly song is supposedly a teaching tool, an extended analogy, to explain the Bible. The partridge in the pear tree is supposed to represent Jesus, the two turtle doves are the Old and New Testament, and so on. Nope – not true. There's a fancy name for this. It's called *eisegesis*. *Eisegesis* is where we read into something what isn't meant to be there. It's the opposite of *exegesis*, where we read out of the text. *Exegesis* lets the text speak for itself; *eisegesis* lets us read into it what we want to read into it. People do this all the time. For example, *eisegesis* says "Mary Had a Little Lamb" is about Mary giving birth to Jesus. Nope. *Exegesis* tells us that it's a nursery rhyme about a girl and her lamb. It only becomes an analogy for the Virgin Birth if we read that back into it.

For a song like the Twelve Days of Christmas, seeing it as an extended analogy for the Bible isn't a bad thing, necessarily – it just isn't what it was meant to be. If you use it as a witnessing tool, or a way to tell a story to your grandkids, or the kid next door, go ahead. Have a little fun with it. However, be careful

with the practice of reading into things what isn't intended. This is especially true with the Bible. We want to be careful when reading the Bible, though, letting the Bible, God's Word, speak what the Spirit inspired. It's God's Word. We don't get to add to it. Even St. John warned about that in his final book, Revelation 22: 18-22, just as Moses did in the beginning of the Bible, Deuteronomy 4:2.

While we don't want to read *into* the Twelve Days of Christmas what isn't there, we do want to recall that there really are twelve days of Christmas. Where the secular, commercial world leads us to believe the Twelve Days of Christmas are December 12-24, the days preceding Christmas, marked with sales, mad-house shopping, and even more maddened shoppers, this is a relatively new idea of marketing. The traditional, Christian understanding of the Twelve Days of Christmas is that the Church holds the festival of Christmas for twelve full days, from December 25 through January 6.

Within these twelve days are several other, special days. On December 26, the Church remembers St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr; on December 27, we remember St. John, the Apostle and Evangelist. On December 28, we solemnly remember the children who were slaughtered by King Herod in his evil plot to murder the Christ Child. The first of January is feast of the Circumcision and Naming of Jesus which took place on the 8<sup>th</sup> day of His infant life. The season of Christmas finally comes to its conclusion on January 6 with the celebration of Epiphany.

Epiphany is when the Christian church celebrates the arrival of the wise men to the child, Jesus, and give homage to the newborn King. I say "wise men" – depending on the translation or the song, you might know them as wise men, Magi, sages or even kings. I've been known to call them the Weisenheimers, just to give them a Germanic flair. Usually, they are described as astrologers, but the term used in the Greek New Testament implies an interest in dreams, stars, and perhaps even magic. They were from the East, presumably the area of Babylon, the region where the Israelites had been taken into captivity 700 years earlier. Traditionally, the story says there were three men, taken from the three gifts they proffered: gold, frankincense and myrrh. Gold, you know: a very expensive, precious metal, useful for the buying and selling of goods. You're probably less familiar with the other two gifts. Frankincense is a tree resin that can be either dried into granules for burning or infused into an oil. Myrrh is a spice, either dry or added to oils to be used for both perfume and for anointing. Gifts from kings; gifts fit for a king. They are gifts for a baby that foreshadow the King's sacrifice three decades later.

We're not there, yet. We have a ways to go. Lent will be here before you know it (February 18 this year!). Until then, we celebrate Christmas and we celebrate Epiphany. And, we're not done, yet! While the world around us tosses the gift wrappings to the curb, boxes up the tree and decorations and stores them in the attic, and hides the Nativity scenes in the hall closet, the Church continues the celebration of the birth of Jesus, the Christ, the Son of God and the Son of Mary. These twelve days are much more than just a silly song that provides a financial "Christmas index" to the economy. They allow us time to rejoice and reflect with Mary, who treasured up all of the events of Christ's birth and pondered them in her heart.

So, continue playing your Christmas music. Rock "The Twelve Days of Christmas" and try to get the lyrics straight, then laugh when you get the prime, even, and odd days mixed up. I'll keep Vince Gerabaldi's "Linus and Lucy" and Handel's *Messiah* (especially the "For Unto Us" chorus) on repeat. Keep your tree and decorations up a few more days. Let the lights burn in the front yard. Continue saying, "Merry Christmas!" a few more days, and share Christmas joy and peace, words of hope and promise, acts of kindness and compassion with those around you. Let them see Christ in you and, through you, to them. And, if asked, tell them, "It's still Christmas!" Then smile and keep on rejoicing that Christ has come for you.—Pastor Meyer


# Agrifest






